## ST VALERY 80 YEARS



12<sup>th</sup> 2020 On Friday June members of the Regimental Association joined Nairn Branch of the Royal British Legion Scotland at a short ceremony at the War Memorial to remember and honour the sacrifices of the 51<sup>st</sup> Highland Division at St Valery 80 Years previously. In addition, members of the Black Watch, Gordon Highlanders and Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders Regimental Association's represented their respective Regiment's. Lt Col (Retd) Bob

Towns Highland Branch Chairman and Nairn Legion President welcomed those supporting the event and set the scene, by reading the entry for the 12<sup>th</sup> of June 1940, from the diary of the Adjutant of 4<sup>th</sup> Seaforth, Capt RAAS Macrae. The Highland Battalions who fought so valiantly at St Valery were represented by; Ally Pattie representing 1<sup>st</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> BW, Peter Finlayson representing 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> SEAFORTH, Maj (Retd) Mick Low representing 1<sup>st</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> GORDONS, George Fraser representing 4<sup>th</sup> CAMERONS and Donnie Petrie representing 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> ARGYLLS. Following the Act of Remembrance, Nairn Provost Laurie Fraser laid a wreath and Association Pipe Major, Maj Jim Stout, played Heroes of St Valery. We Will Remember Them.

## DONALD SMITH

On the same day as our St Valery ceremony, some of our Forres members, namely Albert Duffus, Willie Ross, David Mackay and Kevin Bremner paid a visit to our own St Valery Veteran, and Highland Branch member, 99 year old Donald Smith to wish him well on a day special to him. Donald who lives in Forres, Morayshire, with his wife Helen 85, joined the Territorial Army aged 16, in 1938, signing up with the Seaforth Highlanders. A year later, during training at Fort George near Inverness,



he took a picture of himself with five friends. He was the only one of them to survive. Reliving the Battle of St Valery-en-Caux, the ex-soldier, who was just 19 at the time and had already lost pals at Abbeville, said: "We didn't know anything about Dunkirk. They never told us about it. We finished up holding the perimeter of St Valery at Veules-les-Roses. It was a big, open space and we had no time to dig in. We saw the German army coming across the fields, soldiers in front, the tanks coming behind. We were lying on the ground, facing them, and leaning over our packs with our rifles. We managed to stop them but that's when the big guns opened up. We were facing heavy weaponry with small arms. It was a hellish scene. The whole place was on fire. We thought that was the end.



I was on the Bren gun and the magazine went empty. I lifted my hand to take it off and put a new mag on when a shell burst over us. All I felt was a bang. It knocked my hand right back, took a finger off, and cracked my head. I couldn't remember anything much after that. My friends Nobby Clark and Bernard Finn were either side of me. They were killed outright.

"You don't have time to feel fear. All you are thinking about is staying alive and, as bad as it sounds, killing that German in front of you." He was severely wounded but managed to make his way to the town of St Valery, where he passed out from blood loss and was captured by the

Germans. He and other prisoners were frogmarched along the top of the cliffs where they could see the boats out in the Channel. He said: "There was a big German officer who asked how old I was. I was in a state, but I managed to say, 'I'm old enough to fight you'. He just smiled at me and said in perfect English, 'for you the war is over'."

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> of October 2020 Donald celebrated his 100<sup>th</sup> birthday. Happy birthday Donald, Cabarfeidh Gu Brath.



#### **IN REMEMBRANCE**



As usual branches organised their own local ceremonies where members paraded, suited and booted to lay wreaths or simply stand at memorials in remembrance.
