

First World War – Biography

This is the story not of a areat General, nor of a much-feted national hero, nor indeed of the scion of some grand family; instead, it tells of the all too brief life of just

one of the host of young officers who marched so bravely to the sound of the guns in August 1914, so many of them never to return.

In conversation with **Victoria Schofield**, author of the two-volume history of The Black Watch, 'The Highland Furies' and 'Fighting in The Front Line', Lt Gen Sir Alistair Irwin will discuss how he researched and wrote about the life of his great uncle Lt Lewis Cumming, describing how he and the men of The Black Watch fought and died during the opening stages of the First World War. From his early life on Speyside to the front line, this is a story that will resonate with many families across the land.

Second World War

The award-winning 'Fighting the People's War' is an unprecedented, panoramic history of the 'citizen armies' of the United Kingdom, Australia, Canada, India, New Zealand

and South Africa, the core components of the British and Commonwealth armies in the Second World War. Dr Jonathan Fennell has drawn on new sources to reveal the true wartime experience of the ordinary rank and file; he challenges our understanding of the war and of the relationship between

conflict and socio-political change more generally.

In conversation with Professor Sir Hew Strachan, Jonathan will discuss the way in which fractures on the home front had profound implications for the performance of the British and Commonwealth armies. They will interrogate soldiers' political beliefs, many of which emerged as a consequence of their combat experience and reflect on how those who fought shaped socio-political change and forged the post-war era.





First World War

Much has been written about Field Marshal Earl Haig over the last century, not least by **Professor Gary Sheffield** in his earlier book 'Douglas Haig: From The Somme to Victory'. However, while researching

Haig's nephew Hugo De Pree, Gary was given access to a 'treasure trove' of previously unseen letters and papers belonging to the Haig and De Pree families.



In conversation with **Professor Sir Hew Strachan**, one of the world's foremost experts on the First World War, Gary will talk about the families' 'insider information' on Haig, his personal papers and historical legacy. They will also discuss the unknown story of Haig's nephew Hugo De Pree, which gives a fascinating insight into the life of a First World War Staff Officer and Brigade Commander and led to the publishing of 'In Haig's Shadow'.



Second World War - Nazi Espionage Comes to Dundee

'A Taste For Treason' is the dramatic, untold story of how a Nazi spy's letter, posted in New York and intercepted in Scotland in 1938, broke spy rings across Europe and North America. Following parallel Nazi espionage plots in the UK and

USA and an extraordinary cast of characters as they converged on a Scottish post office, this is a thrilling true story of the international spy hunt that followed.

Dr Andrew Jeffrey will discuss with **Dr Nicola Small** the remarkable housewife spycatcher who set MI5 on the trail of Nazi Germany's most notorious spy in pre-war Britain and how that single letter marked the genesis of an intelligence sharing and security alliance that today includes the United States, United Kingdom, Canada, Australia and New Zealand, the so-called Five Eyes.

Second World War – Prisoner of War

On 2 September 1944, a German Wehrmacht Liaison Officer was captured by the Russians in Bucharest. His name was Lt Col Heinz-Helmut von Hinckeldey and he was to remain a 'war convict' of the Soviets until 1955.

For 11 years, Heinz-Helmut von Hinckeldey had to endure the deprivation – both physical and psychological – of imprisonment; the filth and squalor of the cells in which he was kept; the agony of isolation and repeated self examination; and the pain of ignorance, of not knowing if his motherland (Germany) still existed or whether those he loved, ever realised that he was alive.

Lt Col Charles Wood will discuss with Lt Gen Sir Alistair Irwin how he learnt of this story with fascination and then admiration while working as Military Assistant to Maj Gen von Hinckeldey, who was by then the Chief of Staff at HQ Northern Army Group at Moenchengladbach, Northern Germany. They will talk about von Hinckeldey's life, particularly the 11 years spent in captivity and how he coped with and was shaped by the experience.





Afghanistan and Iraq Wars – What Went Wrong

The Afghanistan and Iraq conflicts, inextricably linked to the ongoing 'War on Terror', have overshadowed the beginning of the 21st century. How did these wars play out, what were their underlying politics and what happened on the ground?

Brig Ben Barry's book 'Blood, Metal and Dust', is the first military history to offer a comprehensive overview of the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq. Shortlisted for The Duke of Wellington Medal for Military History 2021, this book provides in-depth accounts of the operations undertaken by both US and UK forces and explores the wars that shaped the modern Middle East. Journalist and one time soldier, Stephen Paul Stewart will discuss these controversial conflicts with Ben, the high ranking officer who wrote the British military analysis of the war in Iraq.





Award winning journalist Stephen Paul Stewart was given a taste of the war in Afghanistan when he was the embedded journalist with The Black Watch, 3rd Battalion, The Royal Regiment of Scotland, in 2009.

His reporting mission to the front line changed his life forever. He gave up his career reporting and joined the British Army before deploying to Afghanistan as a combat infantryman. His book 'The Accidental Soldier' tells of his experiences.



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

occupied its newly conquered territories throughout Asia. But change was coming. New commanders were appointed, significant restructuring and training took place and new tactics were developed.






